Induction Ceremony Formally Inaugurates Cayman Chapter

Forty-eight Cayman-based NCU alumni and friends were pinned as members, with another 10 scheduled for induction at the November GM. The formal membership step was taken at the ceremonial inauguration of the NCU Alumni Chapter Cayman (ACKy) on Saturday (12 September) at Kings Church.

The inaugural service was facilitated by Pastor Jeff Jefferson, Chaplain for the Alumni Chapter. Dr. Ivor Harry, VP for Educational & Religious Affairs, and the conference's Education Director, conceptualized and chaired the service. The theme for the service was "For Service in this Life."

The Director of NCU's Department of Alumni Relations,

Mrs. Susan Long-Gordon, officiated in the induction ceremony.

Two alumni were honoured at the service for their commitment to service in the Cayman Islands: Mrs. Shirlene Henriques, a former Grand Cayman nursing administrator, and Mrs. Georgia Isaacs, a nurse on Cayman Brac.

Special greetings were brought by Dr. the Hon. Linford Pierson, former Speaker of the Legislative Assembly, recognized during the service as a distinguished alumnus of NCU, and Pastor Shian O'Connor, President of the CIC SDA. Both President O'Connor and Dr. Pierson were inducted as members and Dr. Pierson is slated to join the chapter's executive committee.

Mrs. Long-Gordon delivered a short message in recognition of the Chapter's formation, as well as greetings from NCU's President, Dr. Trevor Gardner.

Ms Patricia Ebanks, President of the Cayman Chapter, outlined the goals of the organisation. These include community and member education and training; scholarships to Cayman's youth; and gifts to support NCU's work. She urged the new members to commit themselves to helping Cayman's youth "become the best they can be."

The Cayman Chapter caters not only to alumni of NCU but also to all friends and supporters of NCU. The next general meeting to which members are invited is scheduled for 19 November. Greetings from Distinguished Alumnus Dr. the Hon. Linford Pierson

It was in 1956 that I (together with three other Caymanian students) received admission into the then West Indies Training College—WITC, (now Northern Caribbean University—NCU). It was, indeed, a defining moment and transformative experience in my life.

My grateful thanks to my heavenly Father for the opportunity to attend WITC, which was so instrumental in laying a solid spiritual foundation in my life. Also, thanks to my Seventh-day Adventist parents for the Christian principles inculcated in me during my early childhood years, and indeed the opportunity they afforded me to attend a Christian learning institution of the calibre of West Indies Training College.

The *ethos* of West Indies Training College was central to the development of a wholistic lifestyle, which took into account the development of the mind, body, and spirit. In this connection, as a member of the College Cadet Corps, I will always remember our exercise routines (including running down to Knockpatrick in the early hours of the morning and back to the campus), to keep our bodies in good physical shape; also the long and intense hours we spent in the library and in our dormitories studying to improve

our minds; but above all, the spiritual guidance which we received, attending Chapel for devotions, as well as attending other church services was, undoubtedly, the most important dynamic of our wholistic development.

It would be remiss of me, if I did not mention the important role played by Pastor Walter Comm (of blessed memory), and his dear wife, Dr. Dorothy Comm, both of whom paved the way for my batch mates and me to obtain a good educational foundation at WITC. I consider it an honour to publicly offer my sincere thanks to the Comms on behalf of the following Caymanian students who were afforded the opportunity to attend WITC in 1956: Namely, Sis. Pearldean Wesley (nee Jeffers) of blessed memory (many of you may know her son, Elder John Wesley); Sis. Patsy Seymour (nee Manderson) of blessed memory; Sister Francine Taylor (nee Haylock), who resides in the United States; and, of course, yours truly. Pastor Walter Comm and his widow, Dr. Dorothy Comm were exceptional mentors to all of us, for which I will always be most grateful.

I will, also, long remember the wonderful kindnesses extended to me by all of my teachers, but in particular Aunt Luz Walters (my English teacher) and Dr. Aston Barnes (my Accountancy teacher), and, of course, the wonderful friendships made at West Indies College with my student colleagues, (including Hon. Pernell Charles, Dr. Neville Galimore and his wife Dr. Angela Galimore, just to name a few).

There is so much more I could and would like to say about my wonderful Alma Mater, but I was reminded, by the President of our Cayman Chapter—Sis. Pat – that I had only **three minutes** to speak. However, before taking my seat, I wish to extend sincere thanks and appreciation to Sis. Pat for her hard work, in her efforts to bring the Chapter to this point in its development. Although I was unable to accept a position in our Alumni Chapter when it was formed, now that I have been able to reduce some of my workload, I have informed Sis. Pat that I am now ready to assist the Chapter wherever possible. Also, although I am a member of other Alumni Chapters, my membership in the NCU (Cayman) Alumni Chapter will always hold a special spot in my heart.
